During the fourth guarter we received donations of food and cloth bags of \$897.25. We Received monetary donations during the quarter of \$8,631.00 and made food purchases of \$10,196.37. We thank God and our church family for helping us meet the needs of the less fortunate in our community. During the months of October, November and December we served 718 clients, handing out 847 bags of food, feeding 2,252 people for two days. With each bag of food, each client is given a tract with the plan of salvation and a schedule of our church services.

We have a team of 19 very dedicated volunteers. During the quarter, they put in over 405 hours. We would love to have you stop by and check us out. You can find some of us here working Monday through Thursday - mornings.



2018 - A YEAR OF REPAIR AND **IMPROVEMENTS**

With the destruction of the hurricane and the age of our building, 2018 was a year of repair and improvements. I am thankful that we could make these improvements by using our reserve funds without having to ask for additional offerings from the congregation. One of the funds we used was the Challenge to Build/Debt retirement fund which was established 18 years ago as a Capital Funding program for 3 years to give "over and above" our tithes in order to provide funding for our new building. A few of us have continued to give toward that fund, which has allowed us to replace Air Conditioners. and do a few minor renovations over the years. Thank you for your sacrificial giving to this fund.

After the hurricanes, we thought because of our large deductible (\$150,000) we would not be able to qualify for funds for repairs, but after working with the insurance company, I was able to secure a check for \$63,000 to assist in replacing our roof. I also found out while negotiating with a new insurance company for our policy, that we had an equipment breakdown rider, that would

allow for funds to help with large breakdown such as an Air Conditioner. We received a little over \$10,000 back toward the replacement of the Fellowship Hall A/C system.

Overall, we spent \$210,000 on our facility this year. \$18,500 for the Fellowship Hall AC, \$143,000 on the total roof replacement, (minus the metal portion), \$28,000 on a new Digital Sign, \$9,000 for sealing and striping the parking lot, \$4,000 for painting the outside of the building, \$3,500 for a New Refrigeration Unit for the Walk In, and \$4,000 for new LED Parking Lot Lights.

We are still in the process of the remodel of the Children's Worship Area, and since we were able to get the plans corrected and passed by the city, a lot of things are happening toward the end goal. Total cost for this will be around \$50,000 including the sound and video system.

Focused and on Mission

The student ministry has made 2018/2019 the year of a focus on discipleship. From the camp we go to, to Sunday Morning United Discipleship, to Wednesday Night United Worship, our focus is simply helping our students be more like Jesus. Our kids are growing up in a tough world. We have kids in public schools, homeschooled, private schools, and yet they face



some of the same temptations each and every day. We truly believe that by helping them imitate Jesus, they will be more than conquerors in life and truly live for Him when they

get a job, go off to college or the military, get married, and more. God is doing some amazing things in our students. However, we still have several lost students that need Jesus. Please begin praying each and

Over the winter break, we took a group of 30 students and adults to Winter SWO. SWO stands for Snowbird



Wilderness Outfitters. It is the camp we are now attending in the summer and winter. It has a strong conservative view of the Scriptures. It teaches boys how to be godly men and girls how to be godly



women. It has a strong focus on discipleship and small groups. The worship services are authentic and powerful. The preaching is exegetical and to the point. The recreation opportunities are second to none with chances to ski, white water raft, tube, zip line, mountain bike, canoe, horseback ride, skeet shoot, paintball, gaga ball, climbing towers, 3 man swings, and so much more! Our cinnamon roll fundraisers are helping us raise money for

transportation to camp this summer. Our other fundraisers including coupon books, coffee, winter banquet, and more help each individual earn money towards summer camp and Ecuador mission trips. Right now we have 42 signed up for summer camp. However we need you to pray that more spots become available with the camp itself. We have some of our spots but need more to open this month. We are

#1 on the waiting list which is a good thing but we have a lot of students wanting to attend!

Finally, as we dive into 2019, please pray for our youth leadership. They do a fantastic job and love our youth. We do however, need more



people who love and are passionate about student ministry, especially men! We sadly say goodbye to one of our youth workers, David Staples, who God has led to attend church with his aging parents




Winter Banquet Coming Soon

Discovering God's Love

In the October 2018 edition of the church newsletter you were introduced to the call and mission of Discovery Group, a ministry of EGFirst entering its



fourth year of multi-housing ministry at a Section 8 apartment complex. To give prospective to the information I'll be sharing in this article, here's an overview of the community demographics given in the October report: The diverse residential population represents a variety of cultures, races, religious beliefs, and values. Many residents are middle-aged or older and are retired, unemployed or disabled, and living alone. There is a large contingent of Spanish speaking residents who are immigrants from other countries. Approximately fourteen families with children live in the complex and only one of these families has both parents living in the home. In addition to single parenthood, the community and family environment meets one or more of the criteria that puts these children at risk for poor social, emotional, economic and developmental outcomes as an adult (poverty, crime, unemployment, arrest or drug use, physical. sexual, or emotional abuse, teen pregnancy, welfare dependence, family dysfunction, etc.).

Here are October-December 2018 ministry highlights:

Weekly: ESL classes, Bible study, devotionals and prayer, fellowship hour, door to door delivery of baked goods, helping hands projects and fitness classes.

Monthly: community brunches and suppers, recognition of birthdays, bingo, and door to door delivery of monthly activity calendar, devotion and evangelism materials. Activities and special events: Thanksgiving and Christmas meals, the Lord's Supper, supported residents in creating items for and packing 29 Operation Christmas Child Shoebox gifts, attended the funeral of a resident's three year old nephew, provided transportation for errands and doctor appointments, provided spiritual and emotional support to a resident suffering from delusions and hallucinations, helped with household chores, through



Devine guidance connected a teenage father to a Christian man who now serves as his mentor, held a prayer service and shower for the teenage father's baby, taught three year old deaf Downs Syndrome child about God's love in one on one Sign Language sessions, shared Christ with residents who identify as Jehovah Witnesses. took several residents

to the Whet Women's Bible Conference hosted by Calvary Baptist Church of Grant, Christmas Tree Decorating event, Community Christmas Store, Children's Book Fair, delivered Christmas stockings

filled with gifts, candy and The Story of Jesus booklets to children, and delivered gifts, special treats and baked goods to residents on Christmas day.



While these members of Discovery Group attend EGFirst, Hal Beaty, Debbie Campos, Bev Edens, Cheryl Frontz, Ernie Green, Chris Hutchison, Erlene Johnson, George Miller, Michele Scanlon, Zim Spaulding, and Lynne Phillips, seven Christians from other churches are also part of this mission team. We are asking God to call out bi-lingual (English-Spanish) speaking men and women to assist in all areas of ministry and men who are available during daytime hours to visit and minister to male residents. We pray these individuals will respond to His call.

We thank God for 'establishing the work of our hands' (Psalm 90:17) and His faithfulness in providing Divine guidance and resources needed for this ministry. A special thanks to Candace Gilbert for preparing the Thanksgiving Day meal along with help from her husband, Jim, and Joe Mazzella. We are grateful for the many ways the Brevard Baptist Association supports this ministry. Thank you Pastor Ralph Nygard, the Finance Team and congregation of EG First for including Discovery Group in the 2019 budget. These resources and the dedication of Discovery Group members means making sure the gospel touches resident's lives, not just their ears.
